

Please do your part to help generate a **TIDAL WAVE** of **registered conservative voters before the 2018 midterms.**

Getting un-registered people to register is easier than you think.

First, take a few minutes to learn about the registration process in your state and county. Deadlines to register, documentation of citizenship, etc. are not always the same from state to state. You can find relevant information by Google-searching *Register to vote in (name of your state)*. Overseas citizens and members of the military can visit [Overseas Vote](#) to produce their voting forms.

Second, to make sure that **you** are registered—and that you’re registered in the right precinct — go to this website:

[Check Your Voter Registration Status](#)

Or, you can call the Board of Elections in the county where you live to find out whether you’re registered, the exact name you used when you registered, and whether your voting status is active.

Third, make a list of every conservative-minded person you know, both in and out of state—friends, family, co-workers, church members, email contacts etc. Pare your list down to a size you’re comfortable with—the more the better! Then, call each prospect and say something like this:

Hey, _____.

Like a lot of other people, I believe the elections this November will be a pivotal point for our country.

I’m concerned enough that I’m doing something I’ve never done before—taking part in a grassroots effort to ensure that a record number of conservatives are registered to vote. The reason I’m calling is to let you know that if you’re not registered, I’ll be happy to send you the information you’ll need to register online.

Would you like me to do that?

Okay, I’ll send you a link to the [U.S. Vote Foundation](#), where you can register online. I’ll also go ahead and put you down on my list of soon-to-be-registered voters—my goal is to get ___ people registered before the election. Just so you’ll recognize it, my email will have a subject line that says *Thank you for registering to vote!* One other thing—if it’s okay, I’ll check back in a few days so you can let me know if you had any problems, and if you do, I’ll be glad to help.

When you email the link to the U.S. Vote Foundation, include a personal note reminding the person that you’ll follow-up in a few days. Follow-up is **CRITICAL**, because some people will either forget, or procrastinate. For prospects who still haven’t registered by the time of your follow-up call, tell them that to make it easier, you’ll just have the election office mail a registration form to them, and that you’ll follow-up the next week to make sure they got it. Remember that many older people are not proficient with computers, so be prepared to provide them with a hard-copy of the registration form if necessary.

Be Prepared to Answer Objections

People who aren’t registered have different reasons for not voting, so be prepared to answer common objections like:

“I don’t vote because I’m too busy.”
They can early-vote, or vote at home via absentee ballot.

“My vote won’t make any difference.”
The 2000 presidential election was decided by just 537 votes in Florida—0.009% of the total Florida vote.

“I’m not registered to vote because I don’t want to be called for jury duty.”
Remind them how critical the November elections are, then tell them that if possible jury service is an issue, they can un-register after the election.

Fourth, keep a written record of the people you contact. You can make a log sheet of your own, or use [THIS ONE](#).

Be sure to save your log of newly-registered voters so you can make reminder calls just before the election. Most people who are just now getting around to registering have a habit of *not* voting, so it’s important that they be reminded — and encouraged — as the election nears.

Fifth, consider forming a “Circle of 3” with two of your friends, with each team member making a commitment to the others to register a minimum of, say, 3 or 4 new voters. Even better, your circle could raise the goal to a higher number of new voters. By working as a team, each member’s enthusiasm will rub off on the others.

Finally, will you start helping register voters, or do you plan to think about it for a while? With all due respect, the longer you think, the less likely you are to act. The 2018 elections are **the most important midterms in your lifetime**. If only for the sake of your children and grand-children, please take an active part in helping protect the Republican majority in Congress. If you don’t help and Nancy Pelosi becomes Speaker of the House, you will kick yourself every which way to Sunday.

Time is of the essence!

All states have **DEADLINES** for voter registration. Generally speaking, deadlines are 30 days before the election. The 2018 mid-term elections will be held on Nov. 6, which means **October 6** will be the deadline to register (in most states). If you’re going to help, you must get to work **NOW**.
